Friends,

I'll never forget the day my very first dog got hit by a car. Being my first dog, it was particularly special to me. We got it when it was only days old. I got to name it. (I named him "Red" after the Huskers!) And, if I do say so myself, it was probably the smartest, best dog that has ever existed.

I knew something was wrong the second I got off the bus and my dad met me at the bottom of our lane. Being all of nine years old, I had outgrown being walked to the house by my parents many moons ago. Not only that, but it was clear that my dad was uneasy. I was struck by this because, as a true Dane, my dad seldom revealed any emotion. But now he seemed nervous. As we walked up our driveway, I soon found out why. My dad explained that Red had been hit by a car, and that there was no way he would ever get better. But, the worst was still to come. For next, my dad said, "so I had to shoot him." I was crushed. Worse yet, I felt betrayed. Sure, Red was hurt, but did my dad really have to shoot him? Only years later did I understand. It was pointless, almost cruel, to allow an animal to suffer.

Curiously, this same kind of mindset is beginning to catch on, not just with animals, but with humans. Too many think that Euthanasia, so-called "mercy killing", is just as applicable to humans as it is to animals. It is clear why. We live in a society that thinks animals are humans and vice versa. How many people now treat their pets like their "children", including (ironically) doing everything in their power to keep them alive. And, how many like to think of humans as "animals", particularly regarding controlling, or, more properly, not controlling, their passions.

The truth is, and I'm amazed I even have to say this, humans and animals are radically different. But, what precisely is the difference? The answer is reason and free will. Humans can abstract more than what their senses perceive. Additionally, humans can choose, or more clearly, not choose what their appetites desire. Even if these two abilities are lost, absent or never developed, the dignity these faculties bring always remains. Since humans are made in the image and likeness of God, they don't lose their dignity just because they've lost their functionality.

This is why it's morally permissible for my dad to shoot Red when he is suffering, but not morally permissible for my dad to shoot grandma when she is suffering. Sure, we could choose a more antiseptic method of ending grandma's life. The reality is, however, whether it is an excessive dose of morphine or a bullet to the head, the only moral difference between the two methods is that one requires less clean-up than the other. Additionally, it makes no difference if my grandma desires death or not. For suicide (assisted or otherwise) as a way of escaping the dark periods of our life, be they at the beginning, the middle or even at the end, is always thumbing our nose at our greatest gift; a gift in the truest sense; our gift of life.

Additionally, there is another level of dignity to human suffering that is not present in the suffering of animals. This dignity is seen most clearly in the example of Jesus Christ. Think of Jesus carrying His cross. Jesus, who was God's only Son, the only perfect man ever to come into existence, chose both to suffer and die. This was not just any death, either, for Jesus suffered one of the most painful deaths imaginable - death by crucifixion. Despite His pain, despite His struggles, despite His "illness" being terminal, He never gave up. Why? Precisely because His suffering was not pointless! Quite the contrary, Jesus' suffering and death won for us our redemption. It was suffering that demonstrated the true depth of Jesus' love for us.

It is the same for all that suffer, but especially for those who suffer at the end of their lives. Here's how. As our bodies grow weaker, we become more and more like Jesus Christ as He grew weaker carrying His cross. As a result, just as Jesus atoned for the sins of all of us through His sufferings, so, too, all of the suffering those close to death endure provide them the opportunity to make up for, not simply their own sins, but the sins of the rest of us as well.

But there's even more. In addition to the opportunity to do penance for either themselves or others, people suffering close to death also help those they love make it to heaven in a different way -- by giving them opportunities to make sacrifices; by giving them opportunities to suffer. Thus, unlike the dog whose suffering is pointless, there is an inestimable value to human suffering, and, although it should never be desired, it is always something that, when forced into, should be embraced.
