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Friends,

A girlfriend turns to her boyfriend and says, "Does this dress look good on me?" A parent asks a child, "Have you cleaned your room?" A couple celebrating their 50th anniversary asks their children, "Are you throwing us a surprise party?" A telemarketer asks the person answering the phone, "Is the head of the household available?" These questions have one thing in common. They usually tempt the respondent to lie.

But is lying in such situations really such a bad thing? In fact, some might argue that sometimes lying is, not just permitted, but a good thing. For example, isn't lying permissible to spare the feelings of another? What about to protect someone from serious harm? It is certainly permissible to lie then?

The answer is no. It is never, ever, under any circumstances, morally permissible to lie. But, before we explore why, let's first remember what a lie is. According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, which quotes St. Augustine, "A lie consists in speaking falsehood with the intention of deceiving." Notice that the intention to deceive is essential to the lie. For example, it is not a lie to answer incorrectly on a math exam. Nor is it a lie when someone communicates one idea, and later, changes his or her mind (e.g. a mom doesn't lie to her children in saying she's going to make cookies and then doesn't because she's changed her mind for whatever reason). Thus, not every false utterance is a lie, but only those that are communicated with the intention to deceive.

Lying is always sinful, not simply because it violates the eighth commandment, but also because in runs directly counter to what Jesus has revealed to us in the gospels. Recall that Jesus says, "I am the way, the truth and life. No one comes to the Father except through me." And it is this truth, as Jesus also says, that sets us free.

Notice how true this is. Even when the truth hurts, there is still a sense of liberation because of the confrontation with reality that the truth necessarily brings. For there is nothing more real, and, thus, nothing any of us want to know more, than the truth, even when the truth, like when someone we love is dying, is really darn hard.

This becomes even more profound when we contrast it with the alternative. Notice what happens when we lie. Not only are we not living in the truth, but we are also stealing that truth, which is Jesus, from our neighbor. When we do this, reality is obscured. We must create an alternative reality built around this lie. This is why so many people lead secret or double lives. The lies we've told must be supported by other lies, which lead to other lies, etc... until we find ourselves living as one person in one set of circumstances and a different person in another.

This is what all lies do. They make us slaves. With each lie we tell, we, like a fly caught in a spider's web, become bound to that lie. We tell more lies to cover that lie, which, in turns, entangles us in that web until we are no longer free to be "ourselves" because "ourselves" have been smothered in a cocoon of lies. This becomes a viscous cycle, which the devil, who, not coincidentally, Jesus calls the "father of lies", uses to keep us from approaching God. The more lies we tell, the more fear of exposure we have and the more "protection" from exposure to the truth we think we need. This is really the biggest lie of all. For the devil knows full well that anyone who does expose himself or herself to the Truth will be set free from even the most tangled web of deceit.

Does this mean we have to tell our girlfriends or wives that she looks fat in her dress, spoil our parent's surprise birthday party and be rude to the telemarketer? Of course not! What it means it that we cannot communicate something we know to be false. There is a difference between being forthright and being truthful. For instance, we could tell our loved ones that a dress does not fit her style. We could distract our parents with questions such as "Do you really think I'd go to all that work?" or some other diversion. Of course, it would be a far better thing to be rude to the telemarketer than to lie. For the one thing we must always do is to tell the truth. Lying makes us in the image of the "father of all lies", telling the truth makes us in the image of Jesus.

This can be extremely difficult for many reasons. Lying is so simple, so easy. In fact, it can become such a habit that lying is almost reflexive. Additionally, it can be difficult, if not next to impossible, to think quickly on our feet so that we might both preserve the truth and deflect harmful sentiments. Remember, however, that this is really the difference between heaven and hell. For the road to perdition, lying, is wide and easy and many traverse it, while the road to heaven is narrow and difficult because it means speaking the truth and this truth can be difficult.


